Grace and Peace to You!

As we prepare for the Easter Season, I wanted to write about one of my favorite prayer practices. When Sara and I were involved with a young adult community in Cedar Falls called Simple Supper, our friend Emma suggested a game called Rose, Bud, Thorn. It was an icebreaker of sorts. We each went around the table and named a good part of our day, a bad part of our day, and something exciting yet to come; a rose, a thorn, and a bud. This became one of our favorite parts of our time together.

When Sara and I went to seminary we found ourselves teaching the Kids of Seminary, sometimes shortened to KOS and pronounced like the word "chaos," we wondered what we might offer these wild and thoughtful children. Sara suggested we finish each night with Rose, Bud, Thorn.

I was wary at first but after some silly answers and giggles, the kids slowly started opening up about their joys, fears, and hopes. Gradually it became the most important part of our youth nights. After a few weeks, we introduced a new category: roots. The roots of one's day were where one saw God. Once again, we were nervous, but the kids rose to the challenge and pointed toward God in their life in inspiring ways. Soon my classmates were pulling me aside in the hall asking what Sara and I had done to their kids. They said, "we can't eat our family suppers anymore without Rose, Bud, Thorn!"

This process of looking back on your day is part of an ancient prayer practice called The Daily Examen. It comes from a branch of spirituality associated with the founder of the Jesuit monastic order, St. Ignatius. The Daily Examen reminds us that God's infinite creativity is the source of our every moment. God's love is constantly pursuing us if we take the time to notice. We are called into deeper conversion as Christians when we recall the day that is past and track down God's fingerprints.

To pray with the Daily Examen, one need only find a quiet place in one's day and in one's home and work through the following steps: 1. Become aware of God's presence; 2. Review the day with gratitude; 3. Pay attention to your emotions; 4. Choose one feature of the day and pray from it. 5. Look toward tomorrow.

Whether you choose to use the Rose, Bud, Thorn method or the more formal one, I highly recommend this practice. As we prepare to feast and celebrate both Christ's saving actions and the defeat of death itself, this is a great season to notice how that same God is breaking into your daily life. I hope Lent has been a time of revival in your hearts and that you will bask in Paschal joy in the days to come. May you persist in whatever prayer pattern you practice or as my friend at the University of the South used to say "y'all stay prayed up!"



Jottings from the Junior Warden

Work has begun on addressing the lighting issues in the church with florescent lights being replaced in the hallways, restrooms, and the kitchen. A number of the 'up lights' in the parlor/library have been replaced as well as some bulbs in the nave, the altar area, and the columbarium. Replacement bulbs for the sanctuary area are proving to be difficult to find and alternatives are being considered as to how replacements can be made. A similar issue exists with regard to the light fixtures in the parish hall. If replacement parts are unable to be found or are too expensive, consideration will need to be given to the replacement of the fixtures. Several exit signs have been replaced as well as the batteries to two emergency lights. Work continues on the exterior lighting of the church.

Aspen Waste Management system was contacted, and a new dumpster has replaced the previous one which had significant deterioration. Bids have been sought for the replacement of the fence surrounding the dumpster as well as issues related to the storage shed floor as well as holes in the roof of the structure. It is hoped that these projects can be completed in the coming month.



As a parish we need to identify ways to fund those larger maintenance projects such as furnace/air conditioner replacements as well as kitchen enhancements.

Civility is Focus of April 4 Community Conversation Sponsored by the City of Ames

The community is invited to attend a presentation called "Civility in Conversations." This event is intended to be an interactive presentation exploring the importance of civility and civil discourse in addressing the challenges of mental health issues we face both from an individual perspective as well as public engagement. The event will be held from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Tuesday, April 4, at Ames Public Library, 515 Douglas Ave. The event is hosted by the City of Ames featuring speaker Scott Raecker, Executive Director of The Robert D. and Billie Ray Center at Drake University. Raecker will lead this interactive presentation, incorporating key strategies that will focus on how we each play a role in creating a culture of civility. Participants will engage with research-based strategies to enhance individual actions that create a culture of civility that is motivated by relationship building, integrity, respect, and accountability.

This event supports Ames City Council's goal to identify opportunities to improve mental and physical wellness together with community partners and is the fifth in a series of mental health Community Conversations. These events are free and open to the public.

EfM seminar at St. John's

What is EfM? "Education for Ministry (EfM) invites participants into small, mentored groups that provide the framework for understanding life and shaping actions as Christian faith is deepened. EfM seminar groups meet in local settings and online and provide a four-year curriculum that develops a theologically informed, reflective, and articulate laity." This is not a class just for those seeking ordination. Every baptized person is called to ministry. The EfM program is administered by the School of Theology in Sewanee, Tennessee, and the tuition is \$330. Since its inception in 1975, more than 100,000 people have participated in this vital program. EfM groups meet regionally in nearly every diocese of The Episcopal Church, in six provinces of the Anglican Communion, and some in virtual classrooms with participants from across the globe.

There are 10 participants currently in the class at St. John's led by Rev. Diana Wright. This is an online class using the zoom platform that meets on Sundays at 6:30 pm for 90 minutes. Classes begin with a review of the reading for that week, followed by some form of a theological reflection. The 36 week course meets every week from September through May. The best way to learn more about EfM is to talk to an EfM graduate or visit with one of the current students. On a personal level, I graduated from EfM in 2010, but have enjoyed participating with this group as a co-mentor over the last 3 1/2 years. The study materials have been updated since I took the course and I find that participating in the study and reflection each week continues to challenge me and provide insight into my relationship with God. Registration for the 2023-24 class will be available this summer.

The Minutes of the Vestry Meeting St. John's by the Campus February 15, 2023, 6:30 pm

Present: Fr. Tom Early (Priest-in-Charge), Amy Mellies (Sr. Warden), Marlene Strathe (Jr. Warden), Joan Aiton (Treasurer), Leigh Ann Long (Clerk), Cristine Mincheff, Tim Muggli, Debbie Haywood, Diane Gillott, Brenda Freeman, Elizabeth Charbonnet.

Minutes of the January 18, 2023 meeting were approved. Financial Report for January 2023 was accepted.

New Business:

2023 Goal Setting: A subcommittee (Fr. Tom, Amy, and Marlene) was created to develop a short list of 2023 goals to present at a future vestry meeting. This subcommittee will review the posters developed from Bishop Betsey Monnot's visit and from the brainstorming session held with the parish.

Greta Muller Levis Candidacy Forms: Vestry approves candidacy for ordination to the diaconate.

Opening Nursery: A subcommittee (Amy and Elizabeth) was created to look into the approach for reopening the nursery. There is interest from some older parish youth in developing childcare experience. Additionally, the possibility of hiring college students through a scholarship program was discussed.

Credit Card Use Policies: Vestry approved canceling of current credit cards and reissuing new numbers to Rachel and David (Fr. Tom's card was newly issued and does not require reissue). This action will be taken as soon as all reoccurring payments are identified for transfer to a new number. A note in the Bulletin will be included to notify the parish that the card numbers will change. Additionally, a subcommittee (Joan, Debbie, and Diane) was created to develop a document for best practices regarding future credit card use.

Pledge Thank You Cards: Thank you card templates for parishioners who pledged for 2023 were distributed to vestry members.

Parochial Report: This year's parochial report will be developed by Fr. Tom and sent to the vestry electronically for approval.

Child Serve Program: Vestry approved use of church for summer Child Serve program. Child Serve to inform vestry if St. John's facilities are selected.

Old Business:

The 1st Quarter Vestry Sunday Schedule is complete, and all dates have been filled.

Priest-in-Charge Report: Fr. Tom noted that he has restarted care center services, is attending the Companions in Ministry program, and is attending the Campus of Collegiate Ministers meetings.

Sr. Warden Report: Amy thanked St. John's for hosting the youth ski trip.

Jr. Warden Report: Marlene conducted a walkthrough of the church grounds and compiled a list of long term maintenance items that are needed. This list includes replacement of aging furnaces, replacement of nonfunctional lighting, kitchen improvements and safety concerns, replacement of broken stained glass plexiglass cover, garbage fence and storage shed concerns, and roof repairs. She recommends moving 2% of the endowment fund returns to the long term maintenance fund on an annual basis. This recommendation will be reviewed at a future vestry meeting. Marlene also noted she is in the process of determining costs and priority for the needed repairs. Vestry members also noted that adding a bike rack and potentially replacing the outdoor sign could also be considered. The vestry also wanted to thank Steve Prater for his leadership in resolving the ongoing sewer issue.

Parking Lot Committee Report: This committee is working on a parking lot policy and is working with the trash company to replace the aging dumpster. Vestry members requested a dual lid on a new dumpster if possible.

Meeting adjourned at 8:32 pm with prayer.
